Upcoming Members' Meeting

Speaker: Chris Novelli, Architectural Historian

The next members' meeting will be held in the Discovery Room of the Science Museum of Virginia. Chris Novelli will speak on "Richmond's Grand Avenues of the Nineteenth Century".

A Richmond native, Mr. Novelli holds a master's degree in architectural history from the University of Virginia. He has done research for the Branch House; for Rau & Associates, Architects and Designers; and for the Department of Historic Resources. He recently completed the expanded National Register nomination for Battersea in Petersburg, elevating it to national prominence. Mr. Novelli is a frequent guide and lecturer in Richmond—expounding on the architectural highlights that are so much a part of the city's unique character.

Driving Directions From the north or west

Take I-95 south or I-64 east to Richmond (I-95 and I-64 run together through Richmond). From I-95, take the Boulevard exit (#78), bear right onto Boulevard. Take Boulevard to West Broad Street (US 250) (4th traffic light). Turn left onto West Broad Street and go two blocks. The Science Museum is on your left.

From the south or east

Take I-95 north or I-64 West to Richmond (I-95 and I-64 run together through Richmond). From I-95, take the Boulevard exit (#78) and bear left onto Hermitage Rd. Take Hermitage south for 1.3 miles to West Broad Street (US 250). Turn right onto West Broad St. and proceed for one half mile. The Science Museum is on your right.

Parking

There is ample free parking adjacent to the museum.

Enter the museum through the main entrance and turn right to reach the Discovery Room.

The VCA is open to anyone with an interest in the care and preservation of art and historic artifacts. Membership includes conservators, curators, historic house directors, collectors, dealers, students, and non-specialists with strong interest in the growing field of conservation.

Bi-Monthly meetings, scheduled from September-May, feature speakers within the VCA and from outside the state, speaking on topics ranging from basic techniques for storage and preservation to the elaborate conservation of some of the most important art and historic artifacts in Virginia.

Meetings are held at many museums and historic sites in Virginia, providing members rare opportunities for behind-thescenes tours of these prominent institutions. In addition, the VCA sponsors fieldtrips and short courses on conservation topics, enabling members to study and learn in a friendly, collegial setting.

DISCUSSION ON THE FUTURE OF CERTIFICATION FOR CONSERVATORS

At the March members' meeting Terry Drayman-Weisser, objects conservator at the Walters Gallery and chairman of the AIC Committee on Certification, will be present to talk with VCA members on the progress and implications of plans to implement a certification process for conservators in the U.S. This is a process that will impact all of us. Plan to be there to join in the discussion on what certification is and what it will mean both to the field and to the individual conservator.

The VCA Spotlights AIC Certification

In the mid 1990s the concept of a certification program for professional conservators in the United States once again became a major topic of deliberation for the AIC. Several years of discussion eventually led to a majority vote by the AIC membership in favor of certification. Accordingly, the AIC Board then established a committee to develop the framework for a certification program. Since 2004, the Certification Development Committee (CDC) has worked towards this goal, with steady input from various other AIC committees and the AIC specialty groups. CDC activities are directed by Terry Drayman-Weisser, who previously served as chair of the AIC Certification Task Force, which initiated and energized new debate about the possibility of certification by completing an in-depth investigation into the topic.

The focus of the CDC is to create a feasible and fair structural format for certification, and to devise the most effective, appropriate means of bringing it to reality. Designed appropriately, the program will encourage participation by a majority of qualified conservators, and allow for those persons to successfully complete the certification process without compromise of the standards that define professional competency.

The AIC certification program is the featured topic of the March 2007 VCA meeting. What kind of examination will be administered and how will it be created? What will be the criteria to qualify for certification? How will certification impact my work and my ability to earn a living? Such questions and other related issues will be discussed to better educate ourselves about impending certification and help dispel myths and misinformation. AIC-CDC members Terry Drayman-Weisser and Frederick Wallace will be in attendance to open the forum, answer questions and provide an update on the status of program development.

Fundamentals of Book Repair Solinet Class—Virginia Historical Society

Wear and tear on books is inevitable, and most libraries perform minor repairs on their damaged materials. Despite good intentions, some materials and procedures used for repairing books can shorten the useful life of an item and make it hard to open and use. Done properly, book repair is an effective preservation strategy that can extend the useful life of a collection and reduce replacement and binding costs.

This two-day class teaches staff members how to perform simple, economical, preservation-quality repairs on materials on circulating and reference collections. It focuses on techniques that do not require expensive equipment and supplies, and can be performed successfully after a short training period. The class does NOT teach techniques for repairing materials that are special, rare, or archival. The following procedures are taught in small-groups through demonstrations and practice:

- tightening hinges when text blocks are pulling away from the cover
- replacing torn endsheets
- replacing torn or damaged spines
- mending paper
- tipping and hinging pages into bound volumes

The class provides context for the repair work. Lectures and discussion address preservation principles, treatment decision-making, and organizing and equipping a repair unit. Included with the registration fee is a book repair kit containing a variety of tools, samples of paper, cloth and adhesives provided by support from the National Endowment for the Humanities.

Intended Audience

Designed for staff members who actually perform book repair in libraries, but also useful for those who supervise repair units. NO prior preservation training will be presumed. Because of support from the National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH) Division of Preservation and Access, ALL SOLINET members are charged the Governing Member rate for Preservation classes and non-members are charged the Affiliate Member rate. Any institution within the hosting state qualifies for the member rate.
