## Letter From the President

## April Meeting at Kittiewan

Kittiewan Plantation lies near the banks of the James River just outside of Charles City. The site is the headquarters of the Archaeological Society of Virginia, housing their collections and research library. The Society cares for the 18<sup>th</sup> century plantation house and the grounds, which contains over 6,000 years of archaeology. Its owners and the site played a role in both the Revolutionary War and the Civil War.

Join us for a tour at the site. This is not your typical house tour! The previous owners spent decades collecting Americana with the purpose of turning the house into a museum. The ASV will guide us through the house, discussing the people who lived at Kittiewan and how the Society is preserving the site.

There is potential to explore the grounds and view the Civil War archaeology (weather permitting). Details about the date and time will be posted soon, but anticipate a Saturday outing starting at 10:30 am.

Andrew Baxter, Sculpture Conservator and longtime VCA supporter will head up our field trip and describe his treatments of Paul Mellon's equestrian bronzes at the museum.

We will also have a guided tour of Bunny's library that contains her collection of books, manuscripts and art on plants, gardens, and landscapes.

use as approved by the Board.


Applicants must be VCA

## TENACITY: Women in Jamestown and Early Virginia VCA Program on January 24<sup>th</sup> 2019 at Jamestown Settlement



There was a great turnout for our January program, with attendees traveling from as far away as Staunton! The evening began with delicious Thai food and the opportunity for the Jamestown Yorktown Foundation staff to meet members of the VCA. Kate Egner Gruber, Curator of Special Exhibits, extended a warm welcome to everyone and introduced the exhibition by asking:

"Can anyone name a female among the early settlers?"
Silence and blank looks...
"Exactly!" she exclaimed.

She went on to explain that the purpose of the exhibition was to give identities and personalities to the women of Jamestown and the early Virginia colony by using a wide range of artifacts to illustrate their lives and narrate their stories. Three individuals were chosen to represent distinctly different groups: Anne Burras Laydon, an English woman who arrived in 1608 at the age of 14 as a maidservant; Cockacoeske, a Virginia Indian woman who was recognized by the colonial government as the "Queen of the Pamunkey" and ruled until her death in 1686; and Mary Johnson, an African woman who arrived in 1623 and labored on a Southside Virginia plantation and later gained her freedom and became a landowner in Virginia.

Not surprisingly, given the fascinating and thought-provoking subject, people gathered around the exhibits in small groups, engaging in lively dialogue. Conservators on hand to discuss their treatments included Melba Myers who had treated African artifacts on loan from the Mercer Museum in Pennsylvania, Tom Snyder who had treated the 'Ducking Chair', a device used for public humiliation, and Kate Ridgway with artifacts from DHR (see link below for blog post).



## Helping Hands Re-cap

The first Virginia Conservation Helping Association Hands event, while small, was a great success! On February 9th about a half dozen VCA members came to the Department of Historic Resources and worked with Lisa Iordan of Petersburg Preservation Group rehouse some their archives. The collections included original letters written by Henry Clay and stuck in old frames, currency from the Civil War mounted on acidic backing and numerous loose boards. that needed to he papers rehoused in archival files with buffered, acid-free tissue.

All in all, about ten boxes and a dozen or so mounted pieces were rehoused and sent back to the Petersburg Preservation Group in better shape than when they arrived at DHR. Not bad for a day's work. Lisa Jordan learned some simple preservation techniques that she can take back with her and teach her staff, which will help to preserve their collections for the future. Hopefully the VCA can have another Helping Hands project next year and continue to benefit the Commonwealth by sharing their expertise with another institution in need.

A special thanks to UVA Conservator Sue Donovan! Without her help the event would have been far less successful and her generosity with her knowledge of paper conservation made all the difference in the world. Also, thanks to Kate McEnroe who helped to organize this event!

**CALL TO ORDER:** President Kate Ridgway called the meeting to order at 6:10 PM.

**PRESIDENTS'S REPORT:** President Kate Ridgway introduced co-worker Chelsea Blake who is interested in serving on the Board in the coming year. Kate reported for Vice President Kate McEnroe that the Helping Hands project went well. Possible ways to invigorate the VCA and possible future directions that the organization might take were discussed.

**TREASURER'S REPORT:** Treasurer Christi Barranger presented the Treasurer's report of activity from August 1, 2018 to February 28, 2019. Beginning balance in the checking account was \$6,973.01, income was \$2,168.95, and expenses \$1,278.98 with an ending balance of \$7,862.99. The Board put together a proposed budget for 2019-2020 that will be presented for ratification by the membership at the May meeting.

#### **COMMITTEE REPORTS:**

#### Membership:

- -Paige Schmidt announced that physical directories have been printed and can be purchased for \$3.00 by members who wish to have one. There are currently 89 members.
- -The new VCA website is live. The Board decided to maintain website care at a cost of \$25.00 per month to help manage the website, due to differing skills levels in future Web Management individuals.
- -It was officially decided that there will be no comprehensive online directory for membership. Practicing conservators and preservation professionals who wish to be contacted for services may choose to be on the "Find a Conservator" tab. This option will be included on the 2019-20 VCA membership application.
- -A Team Drive has been created through the VCA email address for \$5/mo, which will host all of our shared board information. Board members moving forward will need to have a google account to access and contribute to the Team Drive.

**Education:** Bob Self announced that the Website Workshop was canceled due to a lack of interest. The content and cost of a possible program to be presented in the fall was discussed.
