

May Meeting Goes Virtual:

At the core of the problem: A new method used to clean the bores of USS Monitor's XI-Inch Dahlgren Shell Guns.

Due to the need for social distancing with the COVID-19 outbreak, we will not hold an in-person members meeting for May. However, we will be holding a virtual meeting, hosted online through the VCA Facebook page on May 14th at 6pm. For anyone unfamiliar with how to attend a live stream event on Facebook, there will be a follow-up email with instructions, or feel free to contact the program chairs.

Erik Farrell, archaeological conservator at The Mariners' Museum and Park, will provide a presentation detailing the development and use of a custom-designed coring apparatus to clean inside the bores of USS *Monitor's Dahlgren* shell guns.

When the turret from USS *Monitor* was recovered in 2002, it contained hundreds of artifacts including the ship's two XI-Inch Dahlgren Shell Guns. All of these were initially covered in a hard, thick material called "concretion," composed of sediment, marine life, and corrosion. Over time, this material has been removed from the guns' exteriors and, just recently, the Dahlgren's interiors were cleaned. Erik will explain the process behind boring the guns, and what this means for the rest of their conservation treatment.

 <u>Institute of America</u> have educational resources for all ages including videos and podcasts.
- Heritage preservation and architecture enthusiasts should check out Calder Loth's <u>"The Foundations of Classical Architecture,"</u> a four part YouTube series from the Institute of Classical Architecture & Art (ICAA) and his <u>Historic Brickwork: A Design Resource</u>, which examines different brickwork styles found on American buildings from the colonial period into the twentieth century.
- The <u>National Parks</u> and <u>Smithsonian Institute</u> also have distance learning programs.

- Sketchfab, a repository for 3D models, has sections devoted to art, architecture, and cultural heritage! Check out the <u>Rosetta Stone</u>, the <u>V&A's fine art</u> collection, Virginia's own <u>DHR collections</u>, shipwrecks of NOAA's <u>National Marine Sanctuaries</u>, and <u>historic sites</u> around the world.
- My favorite social media campaign by far is the quarantine art challenge, started by Instagrammer <u>Between Art and Quarantine</u>, and picked up by the <u>Rijksmuseum</u> and the <u>Getty</u>, which challanges you to recreate works of art with household items. A great activity for all ages!

Officers-

Secretary: One-year term. The VCA Secretary takes minutes at membership and Board of Directors meetings, retains a record of VCA communications, and sends out meeting notices to VCA membership
